FOREWORD

0 INTRODUCTION

The preparation of this International Standard has been influenced primarily by considerations of a long-term practical quantity-packaging plan for sensitized photographic materials. It should be recognized that some of its specifications do not conform with current practice in certain countries and that it may take several years before consumers and manufacturers in many countries will be able to bring their practices into line with them.

1 SCOPE AND FIELD OF APPLICATION

This International Standard specifies quantity-packaging ranges, in association with size ranges, for sensitized photographic materials in sheets.

2 PHOTOGRAPHIC PAPERS FOR GENERAL USE

2.1 Black-and-white papers (single and double weight)

2.1.1 For sizes up to and including $13 \text{ cm} \times 18 \text{ cm}$ (5 in \times 7 in), quantities shall be selected from the following series :

25, 100, 250, 500 and 1 000 sheets.

2.1.2 For sizes larger than $13 \text{ cm} \times 18 \text{ cm}$ (5 in \times 7 in), quantities shall be selected from the following series :

10, 25, 50, 100, 250, 500 and 1 000 sheets.

However, the following principles shall be applied:

1) If the minimum quantity packaging is 10 sheets, the next larger packaging shall be not less than 50 sheets.

If the minimum packaging is 25 sheets, the next larger packaging shall be not less than 100 sheets.

2.2 Colour papers

2.2.1 For sizes up to and including $13 \text{ cm} \times 18 \text{ cm}$ (5 in \times 7 in), quantities shall be selected from the following series :

25 and 100 sheets.

2.2.2 For sizes larger than 13 cm \times 18 cm (5 in \times 7 in), quantities shall be selected from the following series :

10, 25, 50 and 100 sheets.

3 SHEET FILMS FOR GENERAL PURPOSE (INCLUDING GRAPHIC ARTS)

3.1 Black-and-white films

For all sizes, quantities shall be selected from the following series:

10, 25, 50 and 100 sheets.

3.2 Colour films

For all sizes, quantities shall be selected from the following series :

10 and 50 sheets.
